Run like the wind

Endale, Millhouse win at 25th Ausherman

Twenty-five years: Where'd they go

That had to be the sentiment of race director John Ausherman as he started over 400 runners on their way Saturday morning in the 25th version of the Tom Ausherman Memorial Five-Mile run on Grant Street in Chambersburg.

Since its inception in 1988, the Ausherman 5-Miler has always drawn in the area's best running talent, with local standout Tim Cook winning the innaugaral event. Generous prize money got the attention of elite talent in the region during the road racing hey days of the 1990s and since then performances have been nothing less than spectacular.

The uniqueness of an event to allow "regular" runners to mix it up with national and Olympic cal-iber talent has added to the allure of the event over the years.

The 2012 version did not disappoint.

Abiyo Endale, 28, of New York City and a member of the 2003 Ethiopian World Cross Country Team, led a contingent of Ethiopians in a top-five sweep of the men's open division.

Endale, last year's runner-up, covered the five-mile distance in 24:06, well off the course record of 22:43 (Ruben ChebII, 2004), but nonetheless impressive since he arrived only 15 minutes prior to the event start time.

Due to his late arrival, Endale's race strategy had to go in a different direction.

"I wanted a faster pace as I am preparing for a one-mile event in Pittsburgh next week (GNC Road Mile)," he said, "but I just stayed in the back until 2 1/2 miles left until I felt ready to go."

After clocking an opening first two miles in 9:46, Endale covered miles 3 and 4 in 9:30 to break open the race and close in a comfort-
